

Worship on the Green August 27, 10:00am Again, Janet and I want to thank you for the opportunity to go to Nigeria. This trip would not have been possible without the initial efforts of Mark Fransdal and Chris Congdon beginning our relationship with Banyan Theological Seminary. Our goal with the "Pulpit Swap" with John and Titi Pena was to build on our relationship with B.T.S. I believe it was a great success to have the Pena's as our guests for two weeks to get to know as many of our members as possible. They report back with great appreciation on how warmly they were welcomed at worship and many people's homes. Thank you!

Our Trip to Nigeria was full of many "God Moments" that we look forward to sharing with you. We are grateful for the help Harry and Titus who helped us throughout our trip. Harry is the Nigerian Chair of the Iowa Nigeria Partnership, and Titus is the Maintenance Supervisor at B.T.S., plus is finishing up his Seminary work to become ordained. Both of them saw to our needs from transportation to lodging while we were there.

One of our favorite memories is the day we were both paid with chickens. Early in the day, Janet was given a chicken from Salaminkala for her work at the clinic. She had a long day, and it is very evident that when someone from the USA comes to a clinic in rural Nigeria everyone from every surrounding village comes to see them for medical attention. They were lined up before Janet arrived, and when she left a villager gave her the gift of a chicken. It is considered a very special gift!

That evening I preached at the Banyan Village United Methodist Church. The village is down the road from B.T.S., and gave the land for the original school. The service was packed, and every musical group played before I had the opportunity to preach. They are raising money to replace their roof, and had reached 500 bags of rice pledged to "raise the roof." It was an exciting service, and they had a lot to celebrate! I was given TWO chickens for preaching that night. As Harry and Titus drove us back to campus with the chickens in hand, I named them "Harry and Titus".

The next night, we had fresh chicken for supper. Janet asked "Whose chicken is this?" And simultaneously, Harry and Titus said, "Yours Janet! You didn't expect us to kill Harry and Titus!" We all laughed except Janet, and I think it was only the third time I have ever seen her cry! As far as I know, Harry and Titus are still alive and well at B.T.S.!

I want to report that our Clinic that was built by the financial support of our church, and painted by our 2015 Mission Team of David Neill, Mark, Chris, Janet and I is up and running. Janet worked 4 days at the clinic, and she was impressed with the dedicated staff. It was great to see the clinic being used by the residents of B.T.S. and the area villagers. The clinic has made use of the hospital beds, and birthing bed, plus the medical equipment we have helped to stock clinic. There are still a few things they need, and they are always needing medicine to combat the diseases the residents are constantly fighting such malaria and typhoid.

The Computer Lab that we helped build could use new computers. They are still making the most of the "second hand ones" we sent to help them get started. Blessing is still teaching at the computer lab. With technology getting cheaper every day, I think we would be better off sending them money to buy new computers than sending our out of date models. Water is a big issue at B.T.S., and really became a BIG problem when the 500+ Pastors arrived for the Pastor's Retreat. I'd like for us to see that we start raising money for a new well for the campus. Everyone that was tested while Janet was in the clinic all tested positive for Typhoid, and this includes many young children. Most of their illnesses are related to drinking the contaminated water.

I hope that we will continue supporting the efforts of Banyam Theological Seminary with our prayers and financial support. They are raising up pastors for a church that is growing like "wild fire" in Nigeria. As I taught at the Seminary, and visited with those who attended the Pastor's Retreat, your gifts are making a difference. Thank you for all you are doing in the name of Jesus Christ!

Embracing the Ministry of Interruption

After serving 5 years full time in parish ministry, I often think back of my years in seminary. I recall new faith discoveries, lifelong friends that I made, and the great wisdom of my professors. During my Baccalaureate service, the Rev. Dr. Les Longden spoke of how new seminary graduates need to embrace the ministry of interruption. I thought this was a strange concept to bestow on a group of new pastors. We were expecting something profound encompassing the responsibility of the pastorate, or the power of the spoken word, or even how we participate in the works of the Spirit. We did not receive such advice in the last sermon we heard as seminary students. Rather, we were encouraged to embrace a ministry full of interruptions.

Jesus had a mission the 33 years that he walked the earth. That mission was always getting to Jerusalem where eventually he would be beaten, tortured, spit on, and hung on a cross. His eyes were always fixed toward Jerusalem because the cross was his destiny. However, we find along the way, Jesus is stopped by those needing healing and seeking council on questions such as, what is truth? Or, how do I receive eternal life? Or, what does it mean to love my neighbor? In Jesus' journey to the cross, he was always getting interrupted.

I find myself stopping and reflecting on Dr. Longden's wise words of embracing a ministry of interruption. Like Jesus, the church needs to keep its eyes fixed on the mission, which is making disciples for Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. But also like Jesus, we the church need to be prepared for the interruptions along the way. Jesus never viewed getting interrupted as a burden or a distraction, but as an opportunity for impacting ministry. So this week as you head to your work places, spend time with your families, or enjoy the last few weeks off from school, be prepared to be interrupted. The question you will have to ask yourself is this: "Is the interruption a distraction, or is this an opportunity?"

Jesus is calling us to find opportunity in the interruptions of our lives to do his kingdom work. Let us embrace the ministry of interruption so that those who know God's love as a stranger may come to find in us generous and gentle friends.

School for Lay Ministry

Words From the Dean

Have you ever felt a call to do something more for your local church congregation? Then, according to John Rothlisberger, the School for Lay Ministry (SLM) might be up your alley.

"The most important piece (of SLM) is the goal that we would strengthen the understanding and skills of the laity within the church," he said. "The need is great, and it's more than just filling the pulpit on a Sunday morning."

Rothlisberger is the dean of the SLM at Simpson College. SLM training is a three-year process consisting of four weekends throughout the year. There are three locations for SLM: Simpson College (Indianola), Morningside College (Sioux City) and Cornell (Mount Vernon). There is a total of 12 classes per year based on a broad array of topics. Classes are taught by college professors, conference staff, field outreach ministers or seminary professors.

"The goal is to see as broad a picture of the United Methodist Church, its traditions, faith, its doctrine and polity and theological variations," said Rothlisberger. "The purpose of the program is for laity to get a big picture of the whole thing. The people that participate in it are probably looking to know more about what God is directing them to do in their lives"

While the goal of SLM is to strengthen the local church with laity involvement, he did say that sometimes, God's path for us can take us even farther.

"We don't control what God does with your life," said Rothlisberger. "But many people do feel a call to go beyond (lay ministry)." Rothlisberger reassures those interested in SLM not to be afraid. The opportunities for lay ministers in the church far outweigh the negatives.

You may be a great candidate for the lowa Annual Conference's School for Lay Ministry(SLM). SLM is designed to grow lowa churches by providing a supplemental source of leadership. Some of the ways that SLM graduates serve are: volunteer management, Christian education, care-giving, youth programming, outreach, and the SLM is the pathway to becoming a Certified Lay Minister.

Students devote four weekends a year for three years to this program. Classes are held at the Cornell, Simpson and Morningside colleges on Friday evening through Sunday morning. There are reading assignments, lecture sessions, group discussions and activities. It's not for everyone - you have to be serious about this - but if you are, you will end up having one of the most enlightening experiences in your Christian life. Weekend courses will dig into worship, congregational care, Christian ethics, theological perspectives, missions, social concerns, church history, doctrine and polity and strategizing for growth. You will emerge equipped and inspired to see your life as a ministry and to share it openly in ways that suit your strengths and skills. In our congregation, Karl Dance, Jan Hoover, Jim Reidy, Chris Congdon, Lisa Congdon, Padma Templeton, Sue Ney, Chris Werling-Witkoske are graduates of the program. Shane Waltz, Jon Cooper and Rus DeBonis are current students. Ask any of them about their experience, or talk to one of our pastors about the application process. "What Are We Fighting For?" Study co-taught by Pastor Matt and Pastor Steve

With all the issues facing The United Methodist Church today, there are plenty of theories and opinions about what we should do. The "elephant" in the room is Human Sexuality, and has been a challenge to come to any resolutions. It is a very divisive subject, and different folks in our congregation have dramatic ally difference opinions. Both is us feel we can move forward together. What are we fighting for? This question not only points us to the futility of our disunity but also compels us to consider what we are fighting for–what deserves our greatest intensity and effort as we seek to be faithful followers of Jesus Christ.

We will be offering a study by Bishop Thomas J. Bickerton titled, "What Are We Fighting For? Coming Together Around What Matters Most" beginning Wednesdays for 6 weeks starting September 13 at 6:00 p.m. during B.L.A.S.T. The study offers a way to move beyond all the discord to a hope-filled future by exploring how we can come together around what matters most so that the gospel of Jesus Christ becomes a vibrant part of our lives and witness. Bickerton says, "That fights, feuds, and uncertainties can distract us, leaving us ineffective and mired in mediocrity and decline; but focusing on what matters most causes our ministries to flourish and the church to become a relevant and vital presence in the community and world." The study offers an approach for working together in the midst of disagreements.

The cost of the book for the study is \$12.00. We are limiting the class to 24 because of the size of the room. If we exceed 24, we will look at offering the class at another time. We are

We have taught the Disciple Bible Study for 20 years, and believe it is one of the most indepth studies provided by our Denomination. It uses the same format as Disciple with renown Biblical Scholars sharing about our weekly readings.
