
Generosity Devotions From Our Own!

What Gift Can You Bring?

4 There are different spiritual gifts but the same Spirit; 5 and there are different ministries and the same Lord; 6 and there are different activities but the same God who produces all of them in everyone. 7 A demonstration of the Spirit is given to each person for the common good.

12 Christ is just like the human body—a body is a unit and has many parts; and all the parts of the body are one body, even though there are many.

1 Corinthians 12:4-7, 12 Common English Bible

One hundred or more years ago, congregational singing sounded much different than it does today. While we would recognize many of the tunes and titles of the favorite hymns being sung, the sound of these songs was quite different. Every congregation -- no matter how large or how small -- sang in four-part harmony. Soprano, alto, tenor and bass lines blended together to create a rich, layered sound in each hymn. Today everyone sings melody and so there is no difference to bring out the harmony.

Paul would criticize such a situation as bad for the common good. For Paul, it is the dissimilarities, even the dissonances between and among all the members of the body of Christ that keep it vital and alive. It is the mix of sounds and the clash of interpretations that testify to the vitality of the church. The multiplicity of spiritual gifts moving in the midst of the church is a sign of health, not disease.

Paul knew there was a better way to deal with the inevitable discord that arises within congregations. He celebrated differences. He praised the diversity of spiritual gifts that created a church full of one-of-a-kinds.

This January we are asking around First UMC, "What Gifts Do We Bring?" It's part of our Stewardship Drive (you may have wondered where the estimate of giving cards were this fall, no worries they will come in January this year).

What gift is the most important for a church member? Such a question is meaningless. Such a question isn't even appropriate to ask. For the in the church we are called to God's economy of grace.

Rev. Dr. Jill Sanders writes the following:

The practice of stewardship is essential to the Christian life. All that we are and all that we have are on loan to us from God. Our money, our gifts, our talents, our skills, our passions, our bodies, our rivers and streams, our minds and indeed our very lives are entrusted to us by God... When we practice stewardship, we are able to offer all of these gifts for the purposes they were intended—and all of life flourishes.

Friends are not to rank one gift as great than another. Choir singing as of greater value than ushering. Missions of more importance than evangelism. No in the church we practice the stewardship of the gift we have been given. For all are necessary in the body of Christ the church.

If the church does not hold together the diversity of people and their gifts who will?

Certainly, the business world and market are not going to do it, because business and the Market have a bottom line that is efficiency and profit.

Government won't do it, because the bottom line is meeting the needs of the people and reduce chaos (or is chaos now the point of some in government these days?).

It is left to the churches, synagogues and mosques, because their bottom line is to be building and keeping relationships.

However, we have been too focused otherwise and not on the fundamental the tradition of honoring diversity. As Paul puts it here, "a body is a unit and has many parts; and all the parts of the body are one body, even though there are many."

We need to honor all gifts so that all will take seriously how to give their gift in service to the church and to the others. What gift can you and I bring?

I ask because one way that we can be loyal as a people of God is to be loyal through sharing our gifts.

Church World Service Blankets

January is great month to appreciate a warm blanket. Contributions to CWS Blankets and CWS Tools mean Church World Service will be ready to help families around the world recover from disasters and displacement. What's more, they'll be there to help people gain the resources and develop the skills necessary to build – or rebuild – sustainable lives and communities.

- •\$250 can provide warm blankets for five families left homeless by a tornado.
- •\$450 can provide refugees resettling far from their homelands the gardening tools and materials to build six small raised beds for vegetables.
- •\$750 can provide sewing machines and training for three women, empowering them to earn an income and feed their families.
- •\$1,100 can provide 10 displaced families with emergency food packages that will feed a family of five for one month.
- •\$2,500 can provide 250 blankets to an agency serving homeless individuals and families in the U.S.

Seeking Blood Drive Caller / Scheduler!

Lorna Ericson has been a faithful volunteer for our Life Serve Blood Drives by calling donors to schedule appointments at our monthly blood drive. Our December drive was her last time to help with this. Thank you to Lorna for her dedication.

Life Serve is looking for others who may wish to help them save lives by scheduling donors – either every month or on a schedule that works best for the volunteer.

Description: The Blood Drive Chairperson plays a crucial role in organizing and ensuring the success of regular blood donation events in Cedar Falls. They would work closely with the Territory Representative to receive a list of potential donors for each blood drive. They manage the schedule by contacting donors to make an appointment time for them. By contacting each donor at least twice, they reinforce the importance of their contribution, answer any additional questions, and provide essential details leading up to the blood drive. The Chairperson can use an online platform to efficiently enter donor information, ensuring accurate and up-to-

date records. This step is crucial for maintaining an organized database that facilitates effective communication and follow-up with donors. If someone isn't comfortable using our online platform, the Territory Representative can assist with this part.
