
I love this place . . .

- ... because of our Bus Ministry that picks up many in our congregation who would not be unable to attend worship if it were not for our bus drivers. One of my highlights on Sunday morning is seeing the smiles on the passengers as they depart from the bus. The drivers are very special volunteers who "go the second mile" because they also pick up for Bell Concerts, Christmas Eve services and touring the local Christmas lights along with finishing up with cookies and hot cocoa at the church.
- ... because we host Community Meals. Jesus commands us to feed the hungry, and so we have been doing this ministry for many years. We not only provide quality meals, we also provide an opportunity to feed their souls with friendly fellowship and welcome smiles. Speaking FROM the choir - not TO the choir!


This is a message of invitation and encouragement to FUMC members to come and sing with the Chancel Choir.


Apportionments: Follow the Money

If you take a look at our church budget, you'll notice a large item named "apportionments". Apportionments are the monies we pay to support the structure of the United Methodist Church beyond our local Cedar Falls First church.

Apportionments, like everything else, seem to cost more every year, and you may wonder how our church's share is computed and what exactly we are paying for. To help answer questions like that, we will be hosting our lowa Conference treasurer, Maggie Biggs, on Sunday, January 14.

We are one of the top ten churches in the Iowa Conference, and so Treasurer Biggs will visit us personally to lead this discussion. All interested people are invited. Questions may be submitted anonymously to the church office, and we will pass them on to Ms. Biggs, or you may ask her directly when she is here.

This visit by Treasurer Biggs is an opportunity to learn more of the scope of the United Methodist Church. There are challenges in designing a website that works well on both desktop and handheld devices. Mobile devices just don't have the same amount of room on the screen as desktop units. Mobiles are usually held vertically while desktop computer screens are horizontal, so the viewing environment is completely different.



News From "The Connection"

Does First UMC give you a feeling that you're connected to something big? That's by design. "Connectional" is a word we use to describe the structure of the global United Methodist Church. Each local church is connected to every other local church through a network of districts, jurisdictions and conferences. It's a structure that allows churches to function locally, while still being "connected" to the ideas and resources of a global faith community. January is great month to appreciate a warm blanket, and Rainbow Task Force is promoting Church World Service Blankets+ that month. Contributions to CWS Blankets and CWS Tools mean Church World Service will be ready to help families around the world recover from disasters and displacement. What's more, they'll be there to help people gain the resources and develop the skills necessary to build – or rebuild – sustainable lives and communities.

Between July and October of 2017, CWS provided over 183,000 kits and blankets to refugees and those in crisis in countries such as Armenia, Cuba, Guyana, Jordan, and the United States (including Puerto Rico). Your donation of \$10 for a blanket will provide warmth, shelter, and comfort for those in need in 2018.

Imagine the possibilities:

THERE IS POWER IN HOPE

Nick Vujicic, a young Australian, was born without limbs. Reading in Sunday School about being made in the image of God seemed like a cruel joke to Nick. He seesawed between despair and begging God to grow arms and legs for him. When he was 15, one story in the Bible answered one of his toughest questions.

"When I read the story of the blind man...and how Jesus said he was born so that the work of God could be revealed through him, that gave me peace. I said, 'Lord here I am. Use me. Mold me. Make me the man you want me to be."

Vujicic learned to write using the two toes on a partial foot. He also learned how to throw tennis balls, answer the phone, type, walk, and swim. He invented new ways to shave and brush his own teeth. He even earned double degrees in accounting and financial planning by age 21. He has since become a motivational speaker to Christian congregations in over 12 countries, and he has ministered to over two million people. He also oversees Life Without Limbs, an organization for the physically challenged.

Such stories have a way of minimizing our own problems and giving us hope. Stephen Ministers are people who have had training to instill that hope as they come alongside others and help us carry burdens of various kinds. If you are in need of some hope as we begin this new year, please reach out to one of our pastors or call the church office, and you will be confidentially directed to one of our Stephen Leaders.

Rainbow Missions Covenant Explained

Ever wonder why our missions committee is called the Rainbow Task Force? It is because of an Iowa Annual Conference program which encourages local churches to spread their

mission dollars over a variety of categories, each represented by a color of the rainbow. That's not too hard to understand, but then the conference gets its metaphors all mixed up and treats the rainbow as an obstacle to overcome and throws in first, second and third-mile designations for how well a church goes under, over, or through their rainbow. Below, we'll walk you through the miles and the colors and we'll show you how we're doing.



First Mile: this means a church is pretty much just looking at their rainbow from a distance, and not trying to reach it. To be a first-mile church simply means that apportionments are paid in full at the end of the year. Apportionments are a church's share of the administrative costs of our denomination. Think of it as our "taxes" to support the global United Methodist Church. How do we rate? Paid in full.

Second Mile: here's where we get into the colors of the rainbow. Our rainbow has seven colors, each representing a mission category. A second mile church will send \$6 per member to world hunger (green) and \$1 per member to the other color categories. How are we doing? Here are our figures as of the end of November 2017:
