

thoughts from Steve

I am writing this as we are making our last minute preparations for Nigeria. We have just a few things on our list to check off and we are set to go. It is a challenge to travel to Nigeria. We will be in a very remote part of the country that is dry most of the time except during the rainy season. There are no wild animals like lions, tigers and giraffes roaming the country side. There are colonies of baboons in the mountains that are heard, but not seen. There is a very venomous snake that roams the area that we have to be watchful for, especially at night.

The most interesting experience for me is being near the equator. We have 12 hours of daylight and 12 hours of night. It wavers only about 10 minutes one way or another. So 6:00 p.m. it starts to get dark, and at 6:00 a.m. the sun begins to rise. It would make it great for going to bed early, but it is 100 degrees and 100 % humidity around the clock. It is miserably hot all the time, even when the sun goes down. No wind, except when a rain storm is blowing in. This is not a trip to a vacation resort.

So why are we going? Our first trip was one of the most glorious experiences in our ministry, and when we returned the first time, I was already thinking about returning. From helping unload the sea container filled with school kits, layettes, and medical supplies to witnessing them being delivered and distributed among children and the medical clinics. Seeing to joy in their faces was like a "God moment" where I could fell the presence of God working in and through those who were there. Also, it was like being part of the early church and the disciples spreading the Good News of Jesus Christ throughout the little villages. The church is on fire, and growing as people are finding hope and meaning in their relationship with Jesus. Their worship is a joyful expression of their new found faith.

So we want to say thank you for allowing us the opportunity to return to Nigeria. Your support and prayers in making this happen are greatly appreciated. This trip would not have been possible without a church family that has a passion for doing ministry beyond our four walls. Your years of being a 3 Mile Rainbow Covenant Church since the inception of the program are a testimony of what this church does in the name of Jesus Christ. From hosting Community Meals and supporting the work of Love INC to opening our doors for the Ingathering and annually sending off 600+ School Kits are just an example of a few things you do that go over and above just being a church on the corner of 8th and Clay. Thank you!

I also want to thank Mark Fransdal and Chris Congdon for making the initial trip to Nigeria and opening the way for our church to get involved with Banyan Theological Seminary. Out of this relationship we have built a Medical Clinic, Computer Lab and provide scholarships for the students. During this trip Mark, Chris and I will be working on another 5 year plan with B.T.S., while Mark and Chris will be working with John and Titi while the Pena's are here in Cedar Falls for the Pulpit Exchange.

I want to say thank you to a very special person named Ione Zach. Ione died July 29, 2011. I had visited Ione several times before her death, and noticed that she had pictures of Jesus in every room, and on every wall in her apartment at Windgrace. When I asked her about it, she said, "I have them arranged so that everywhere I sit, I can see Jesus." She had collected pictures and paintings of Jesus from all over. I received a couple of them after she died. Ione and her husband Bill lived very frugal lives. They had no children. The church was their family and they left a legacy. Ione and Bill left their estate to the church. Half went to the Endowment Fund, and the other

half went to the Missions Committee (Rainbow Covenant Task Force). Janet and I each received \$1,000 from the Ione Zach Mission Fund to help cover the expense of our trip to Nigeria. So I say thank you to Ione Zach for helping make this trip possible.

When we return we hope to share many "God Moments" with you, and celebrate the many ways our church is making a difference in the world in the name of Jesus Christ as "Builders of the Kingdom."

What's new with the Women at the Well? Find out July 16

Did you know the church is in prison? Women at the Well is our sister congregation, a United Methodist congregation within the walls of the women's correctional institution in Mitchellville, Iowa. The pastor of this ministry, Rev. Lee Schott, will give the message at our Transformation Worship on Sunday, July 16 to share with us about the ten years of weekly worship, supportive community, faith nurture groups, and aftercare we have offered to the women there. We will receive a special offering during worship at all services that day for Women at the Well, too.

And, we have an opportunity to worship with the Women at the Well Prison Congregation within the walls of the Iowa Correctional Institute for Women in Mitchellville. Ten guests from our church will be allowed to come into the facility for the weekly worship service from 7:00-8:30 Thursday evening, August 17. All individuals visiting Women at the Well must pass a background check in order to be admitted to the facility. Women at the Well must submit the names, dates of birth and social security numbers of everyone requesting approval to worship with them at least three weeks in advance of the visit. So, check your calendar and let Lisa Congdon know if you are interested. We'll take the first ten people who show interest, and we'll need to collect the security information by July 27.

2 weeks in the life of a Senior Pastor

As many are aware, the last 2 weeks Pastor Steve and Janet have been in Nigeria working in the mission field. Pastor Steve has been teaching at the Banyam Theological Seminary and leading a pastor's retreat while Janet has been busy serving at the medical clinic. Lisa Congdon, our office manager has also been gone on a mission trip to Henderson Settlement. Needless to say, we have been a bit short handed these last few weeks.

The morning Pastor Steve and Janet were to catch their flight, our bell tower was struck by lightning. Thankfully there was no fire, but many of our systems in the church have been affected and we have been working through those difficulties while restoring those systems. Pastor Steve came across the street when he saw the fire trucks and asked what had happened. Upon hearing the news and learning that everything was under control, he told me "For the next two weeks, its all yours!"

In Steve's absence, I have officiated 6 funeral services, countless hospital visits, interviewed potential staff applicants, preached at 2 midweek worship services, our VBS was in full swing, and of course Sunday worship comes once a week. It has been very busy around our church the last 2 weeks. I have come to really appreciate having a second pastor here!

Today I am taking a moment to reflect. I realize how fortunate our church is to have such a caring staff and volunteers that make the scope of ministry happen. The last 2 weeks is more of my "normal" in ministry. Prior to being appointed to Cedar Falls, I served for 5 years as a solo pastor in a smaller congregation. There were fewer people and resources to help share in the load of ministry. We are blessed to have such a caring staff and Spirit filled laity who take the call to ministry seriously here. No one

pastor or staff person can possibly serve the needs of our church individually. It is because of everyone's willingness to serve that our church stands at the ready to answer Christ's call in our community. In short, I could not be more proud to serve as one of your pastors!

I am also grateful for Pastor Steve's ministry to our church. Steve and I have a similar leadership style, but differing personalities. I think this is a good thing! We both have a passion to grow our church in number and depth of discipleship. We enjoy co-teaching classes together, laughing in the office, and gathering in each other's homes to dream about ministry possibilities. Not only that, but we have a lot of fun doing it. Pastor Steve is a great mentor and leader to many, including myself. I for one am glad he has returned home!

It is such a joy to be in ministry with each and every single one of you. Our church is a growing and vital place for the Kingdom of God. Thanks be to God for the partnership and calling we all share to make disciples and transform the world.

Lightning Strike Recovery

On Wednesday, June 14, at about 9:30 in the morning, our church was struck by lightning. It was a big hit that blew a hole in our tower roof and damaged many of our electronic systems. Immediately after the strike, the Fire Department was called and the FirstKids moved to the Gathering Place, prepared to evacuate, if necessary. While we didn't have to leave the building, it is good to know that we can handle an emergency in a orderly way.

The hole in the roof was fixed immediately - within just a few hours of the strike, but other damage has taken more time to discover, diagnose and remedy.

The fire alarm main panel was damaged and every single detector, notifier, and door closer had to be inspected. It was a huge job that wasn't finished until June 27. Thanks to Steve Aries and Primary Systems for jumping right on it.

Our telephones system also limped along with limited usefulness until becoming fully functional again, also on June 27.

Various light switches have been replaced and the speakers for the electronic carillon are not functioning and are awaiting a technician to visit.



Particularly hard hit was the audio/visual system in the sanctuary. The lightning knocked out some parts of the system, and left others un-touched. The speakers mounted in the cross are damaged and cannot be used. The projection screen does not respond to commands to go up or down, and the projector itself appears to be dead. We suspect there is some damage to the central "brain box" that controls it all.

We have done as much diagnostic work as we are able to do on our own, and have reached out to Theatrical Media Systems, the company which installed the system, to help us move forward with a recovery plan. They are currently reviewing our system plans and will send a technician in July. The sanctuary system is made up of "smart" components which are programmed for our specific application, so recovery isn't a simple matter of swapping bad boxes for new ones. Thank you for being patient as we work through this - it will take a while.

The good news, of course, is that nobody was injured in the lightning strike, and we've had ways to work around the damage to continue our worship and our programming without interruption.

Words From the Dean

Have you ever felt a call to do something more for your local church congregation? Then, according to John Rothlisberger, the School for Lay Ministry (SLM) might be up your alley.

"The most important piece (of SLM) is the goal that we would strengthen the understanding and skills of the laity within the church," he said. "The need is great, and it's more than just filling the pulpit on a Sunday morning."

Rothlisberger is the dean of the SLM at Simpson College. SLM training is a three-year process consisting of four weekends throughout the year. There are three locations for SLM: Simpson College (Indianola), Morningside College (Sioux City) and Cornell (Mount Vernon). There is a total of 12 classes per year based on a broad array of topics. Classes are taught by college professors, conference staff, field outreach ministers or seminary professors.

"The goal is to see as broad a picture of the United Methodist Church, its traditions, faith, its doctrine and polity and theological variations," said Rothlisberger. "The purpose of the program is for laity to get a big picture of the whole thing. The people that participate in it are probably looking to know more about what God is directing them to do in their lives"

While the goal of SLM is to strengthen the local church with laity involvement, he did say that sometimes, God's path for us can take us even farther.

"We don't control what God does with your life," said Rothlisberger. "But many people do feel a call to go beyond (lay ministry)." Rothlisberger reassures those interested in SLM not to be afraid. The opportunities for lay ministers in the church far outweigh the negatives.

You may be a great candidate for the lowa Annual Conference's School for Lay Ministry(SLM). SLM is designed to grow lowa churches by providing a supplemental source of leadership. Some of the ways that SLM graduates serve are: volunteer management, Christian education, care-giving, youth programming, outreach, and the SLM is the pathway to becoming a Certified Lay Minister.

Students devote four weekends a year for three years to this program. Classes are held at the Cornell, Simpson and Morningside colleges on Friday evening through Sunday morning. There are reading assignments, lecture sessions, group discussions and activities. We got to hear about some of the events and things that they do and the center they get to hold the events in. I can incorporate this into my everyday life and faith journey by helping become more multicultural and to help local events and organizations become more welcoming of different cultures and religions."

"I learned that people are pretty friendly and helpful, even in New York City where it seems everyone is in a hurry. Our group included a person who needed a wheelchair, and it was eye opening to me how many barriers there are to be able to navigate the city, probably any city, with a physical handicap. I came back from the trip with a renewed faith in the younger generation – our up-and-coming leaders, and think we are in good hands."

"I loved that after talking about issues of diversity and inclusiveness all day we could go out into the city and find neighborhoods where different ethnic groups were sharing public spaces in peace.
