When life is so busy consider "The Beloved Prayer"

"Pastor Scott, I am wondering how to go about praying. I mean life gets so busy that I feel at times I have lost sight of what is important to me."

Do you feel like this from time to time? I certainly understood her when she said this to me. It is so easy to put prayer aside in a busy schedule.

So, I thought I would respond not just to her, but to us all. I have been using this past month or so a particular form of prayer, and for me it has been a rather simple yet profound practice of prayer.

First of all, sit relaxed and at ease. Have confidence that God's love will show itself in some way. For the first 5-10 minutes, without fuss, say the following words slowly and fervently: Jesus, you are the beloved. Repeat the words as necessary. Let your heart fill with praise and thanksgiving for Jesus. Let distractions float by, even when they press upon you. After a while, the distractions will seem less and less urgent as you let them be. Simply be with Jesus in this precious moment.

Then gently, and without fanfare, move on to the next 5-10 minutes. Paul reminds us in Romans 9:25 that we, too, are destined to become beloved. Another simple phrase is added to the beauty of this meditation: I am beloved. Let your soul soak up God's favor. At first, this shift might seem difficult. But give it time in the depth of prayer and let this truth settle in.

Then go on to the next 5-10 minutes. I have found this portion of the prayer to be a rich and holy connection with others in using the phrase: we all are beloved. People come into your heart: a neighbor, a friend, a relative, someone you read about in the morning paper. The important thing is not to exclude anyone. It has been amazing to me how this part of the prayer has changed the way I view others.

At the end, simply conclude with a word of thanksgiving or the Lord's Prayer.

This prayer is called "The Beloved Prayer," and I commend it to you as a way of meditation and a way not to lose sight of what is important to you.

May God bless the rest of your summer!

While our pastors haven't identified them as such, we have two mini sermon series going through late June and July. June 23 we looked at lessons of Attentiveness which can be learned from the stories of Elijah, found in 1 Kings. On June 30, and July 7, we stay with Elijah and focus on lessons of Empowerment and Trust.

Then, for the next three Sundays in July, we will shift to the New Testament and explore some of the teaching parables of Jesus found in the Gospel of Luke. These stories inform our understanding of how Jesus would have us live as his disciples. All of this points us toward a

new teaching series which will begin in August, with both Pastor Scott and Pastor Matt leading us through "The Marks of a Methodist". If you'd like to read ahead on the teaching passages for the next few weeks:

You Might Be On Camera

Here's some news that's exciting to share, and maybe a concern for some. We are now livestreaming the sermon/teaching portion of our Sunday worship services on Facebook. We're thrilled to be able to share our sermons with the whole world in real-time. If you can't make it to church on Sunday, the Transformation message goes live about 9:00, and the Traditional message goes live at about 10:25 – please tune in.

Sharing our message with the whole world is important, and so is your personal security. The ability to stream video to the internet means that there are live cameras in our worship



spaces. For some people, this might be a concern. There are all kinds of reasons that any particular person might not want the world to know where they are at that moment on a Sunday morning. The vast majority of the time, the pastor is the only person visible in the livestream, but sometimes portions of the crowd are visible, too. If you have any questions about where to sit in our worship spaces so that you will not be visible to the cameras, please talk to Chris in the media office.

Three Ten Connect

Here's an easy way to welcome our guests in Sunday worship called **3 • 10 • Connect**.

It's simple: in the first three minutes after a worship service has ended, look around in a ten-foot radius and see if there's someone you don't know. If so, stick out your hand and say "hi". Make a little conversation. Ask them if they have any questions about our church, and if so, volunteer to introduce them to a pastor, a staff person, or someone you know to have the answer. Then, be sure to say that you, personally, are glad that they are here, and that you hope to see them again. It's that easy. 3 • 10 • Connect.

Worship Teams

What could be a better way to reach out to others than to lead them and assist them in worship? There are opportunities in both Transformation Worship and in Traditional Worship to lead the time of welcome and announcements, read scripture, lead prayers, make music, serve communion, present the children's message, and help on the tech team. There also are roles to fill on our hospitality team as greeters, ushers, Welcome Center hosts, and snack servers. There are plenty of jobs for everyone to have one! Pastor Matt Taking Renewal Leave

I am thankful that I am living in a time where the Iowa Annual Conference leadership is not only encouraging, but in many cases mandating its pastors to take a spiritual renewal leave every 4 years. This is absolutely counter cultural and a reclaiming of the conference to have healthy, balanced, and spiritually filled clergy leading our churches.

The findings of a recent survey of ministers five years after they leave seminary reports one in five have already suffered burn-out. 80% believe there is undue pressure on their families. 70% sleep less than seven hours a night. 50% report that they have a close friend. These are alarming statistics that reveal that many pastors are not functioning at the height of their kingdom potential because they are simply burnt out from the rigors of congregational ministry.

I want to clarify that I am not burnt out. I am in love with my calling, my colleagues, and most importantly, the congregation that I have been appointed to serve. I am able to maintain a high level of energy and enthusiasm for ministry because I do my best to practice

healthy boundaries. Self-care is a high priority of mine so that I can be at my very best to serve you. The time for a minister to take a spiritual renewal leave is not when they are spiritually drained. At that point, a leave has occurred far too late.

I am taking a spiritual renewal leave during the month of July while I am at the top of my game so that I may endeavor to remain that way in service to our church. During this time of leave, I will be engaging in rigorous spiritual



disciplines, tending to my family, and fishing as much as possible! It is my prayer that this time of rest and rejuvenation will lead me deeper in my personal relationship with Jesus, allow me to reconnect with my wife and child, and dream about ministry possibilities at First United Methodist Church.

I covet your prayers during this time as I hope you know I am always and continually praying for you. Serving as one of your pastors is my life's joy. Thank you for all the ways that love and care for your clergy while we love and care for you.

Did you know?

That the Church Endowment Committee has been quietly funding numerous projects and activities of the church over the years.

Due to generous donors who had the foresight, love and desire to leave gifts to the church

via their wills and through gifts while still living, the committee has been able to wisely invest these gifts.

The Endowment Committee receives requests from various Church committees and annually disburses funds to support the Church and its ministry.

Since 2016, the Committee has disbursed over \$200,000 to allow the Church to fulfill our vision to Love First, Gather, Grow and Go...Together.

- 6 unsharpened pencils with erasers (plain - no advertising)
- 1 box 24 crayons (ONLY 24 count, please)
- 1 box of 12 colored pencils
- 1 pair BLUNT scissors (rounded tip, no plastic scissors)
- 1 2 inch or larger eraser
- 1 12 inch/30 centimeter ruler (hard or flexible, must be flat and have metric markings)

In particular need right now are crayons, colored pencils, and notebooks, so watch for the sales in late July and buy a shopping cart full!

Lay Leader's Report on the Iowa Annual Conference

The 2019 Iowa Annual Conference was held June 7 through June 11 at the Iowa Event Center in Des Moines. Friday evening was reserved for pre conference clergy and laity sessions with the conference gaveled into order by Bishop Laurie Haller at 9AM Saturday. The following

three and a half days were filled with worship, addresses, and presentations of and voting on statewide policies, procedures and resolutions.

There were times it almost seemed as if there was a celebration of sending forth from First Church. Rus Debonis was recognized as a graduate of the School for Lay Ministry, Padma Templeton was named as Licensed Lay Minister, Jordan Derhammer was accepted as a Provisional Elder, and former youth pastor, Steve Braudt, was ordained as an Elder in full Connection, these last two referred to by the Diakonos (formerly pages) as official old people. During the Monday fixing of

appointments Padma was assigned to Slater UMC (near Ames), Lisa Congdon to Washington Chapel replacing Jordan who was named as associate to Iowa Falls UMC and pastor to Alden UMC. We are pleased that both Pastor Scott and Pastor Matt will continue to shepherd the flock here at First Church. There was even a shout out from District Superintendent Rev. Paul Wilcox, to the Circuit Riders of FUMC Prayers for, and blessings on, all that have

answered the call to serve.

One of the first items presented and the last to be voted was the annual budget. Going into 2020, the budget is less than the budget for 2019. The end result, for the local churches, is that there will be a decrease in the annual apportionments. This does, however, also mean a decrease in funds for many of the church's ministries and missions, including the closure and sale of Pictured Rocks Church Camp near Monticello.

There were presentations and votes for the continuation of all the standing committees and commissions covering everything from missions, ministries and congregational support, and resolutions regarding firearms and child safety, ICE, pollution and climate crises and the traditional plan regarding LGBTQ+ status, as voted on by the Special General Conference in February 2019. There were also elections for delegations of both clergy and laity to attend Jurisdictional and General Conferences to be held in 2020. Both our pastors were elected as alternate delegates. We are well represented.

There was discussion, dissension and holy conferencing; worship, praise and promise. We were told although one person cannot change the world, we *can* change the 3 feet around ourselves. If we all do that, then we can make a difference in the world.



LED conversion

Things are a bit brighter around First UMC, and becoming more so every day. Head custodian John Bentley is replacing most of our older light fixtures with new LED units which are both brighter, and more energy efficient. This includes replacing fluorescent lights in classrooms and hallways, and will eventually include replacing those awful sodium-vapor lights in

Fellowship Hall. The work has already been done in the main hallways of the second and third floors and the difference is brilliant! While there is a cost to replace these fixtures, a study performed last year determined we would realize a significant savings in electricity usage by switching to LED lights, so it is a matter of good financial stewardship as well as environmental stewardship to make this change. Thanks to John Bentley, the Trustees, and the Endowment Committee for making this possible.

Food Bank Personal Care Items - July Mission of the Month

Did you know...in addition to food donations, the Northeast Iowa Food Bank accepts personal care items. An estimated 46,440 northeast Iowans struggle with food insecurity.

Many of these same individuals also struggle to provide personal care items for their families, and government food assistance programs such as SNAP do not provide assistance for purchasing personal care items. No access to personal care items leads to poor hygiene, health issues among both adults and children, and damage to a family's well-being.



Nonprofit organizations are often in short supply of personal care items and clients are unable to purchase these items with SNAP benefits (food stamps). The folks at the Northeast Iowa Food Bank believe that these items are a basic necessity to live a healthy and happy life. They are having a drive to collect these items for their clients:

- Toilet paper
- Soap
- Shampoo
- · Toothbrushes/Toothpaste
- · Boxes of tissue
- Deodorant

Bring any of these items to the display in the Gathering Place at the church during the month of July, and we'll see that it gets to the Food Bank.

Be a Blessing to Someone Through Love INC

People in need will often approach a church for assistance. Unfortunately, many churches are not equipped to meet the variety of needs that are presented. That's not a failure of the churches – at their core, they are faith organizations, not relief agencies. But, the Christian imperative is to help. Love INC works like this: when someone approaches a member church for assistance, they are referred to Love INC. Love INC then conducts an interview to fully determine the need, and which church is best able to assist. Love In The Name of Christ (Love INC) pools the strengths of area churches and agencies to reach out to those in need – our church is one of 29.

Putting Love Into Action

Many years ago, Joanne, the young mother of an infant child, was devastated by the unexpected death of her husband. She was now a young widow with a small child. In the months that followed, she tried several ways of dealing with her grief and pain, but found very little help. As a result of her own experience, a seed was planted in her heart – a desire to be there for others who faced similar circumstances.

A few years later, Joanne saw a notice in her church bulletin inviting people to serve as Stephen Ministers. She responded. In her decade of service as a Stephen Minister, Joanne has had the opportunity to care for people with a variety of needs, including a recent care receiver who was young widow. Joanne said, "It was very satisfying to be able to give her the kind of help I didn't have."

Like many Stephen Ministers, Joanne has noticed a positive ripple effect on many other aspects of her life as a result of her involvement in Stephen Ministry. "It helps me handle my friendships and family relationships more maturely and improves the way I related to my co-workers."

A new training class will begin this fall. After the 50 hours of class, Stephen Ministers are assigned to meet weekly with a person of the same sex and help them walk through the stress of bereavement, terminal illness, single parenting, long-term illness, job loss, or other stressful situations. If you choose to, you may also take the training for your own benefit and not become a part of the formal Stephen Ministry group.

If, like Joanne, you sense God calling you to put your love of God and others into action, and want to know more, watch for more announcements coming soon.

Imagine yourself looking out at the crowd from the most famous stage in the world: Carnegie Hall!

Mary Schlicher did that in April, as she participated in a special concert of music by composer Mary McDonald.

In April 2018, our chancel choir was invited to come to New York City to sing in a concert of Mary McDonald music in Carnegie Hall on May 26, 2019. This was the result of one of our anthems being posted on YouTube, which was referred to as our "audition recording." I was the only member of the choir who expressed interest in participating, contingent on my sister Jenifer going with me as she can navigate NYC. She agreed and was considered to be a VIP which entitled her to attend all rehearsals, the concert and the reception after the concert. The next months were a series of deposits, payments and balances for our attendance and lodging.

May 21 of this year I flew to Syracuse and 2 days later we took the 6-hour Amtrak ride to Penn Station which was about a mile from our hotel. On Friday, the 24th, the real fun began as we had our first half-day rehearsal. The choir numbered 256! We had assigned seats and I was super lucky to sit between 2 altos, Ruth and Carol, from Calvary UMC in Latham, NY. There were choirs from all over the U.S.; I was one of 3 singers there on my own. Mary McDonald was introduced. She had serious surgery about a month before and had cancelled 4 previous appearances, but she didn't want to miss her Carnegie Hall debut or the world premiere of her composition "This is the Dream." Our choral director was Jonathan Griffith who worked so hard that sometimes I worried about him. After about an hour of preliminaries, we started by singing Mary's arrangement of "Let There be Peace on Earth." That was when Jenifer's next responsibility commenced—to shed tears for the beautiful music.

The following day we had our second half-day rehearsal. In all, we sang 7 pieces--all either written by or arranged by Mary McDonald. They were a combination of sacred and patriotic pieces which was appropriate as we performed on Memorial Day weekend. Our portion of the concert (Act 2 of 3 acts) was called "Immortal, Invisible." Our choir was accompanied by a full orchestra and Mary McDonald on piano.

It was one of the highlights of my life! Looking back on the experience, I am overwhelmed with gratitude to God for so much--that I could share the experience with my sister, that I had the strength and endurance to stand and sing for long periods of time, that so many people were so nice to us, that I met some new friends(similar to a church camp experience!), and that it all worked out so well. Please feel free to ask me about my Carnegie Hall debut!
