"In the beginning when God..." (Genesis 1:1 NRSV)

Dear Members and Friends of First UMC,

On my first Sunday leading worship here at First, I explored Genesis chapter 1 and our beginnings together. I continue to be curious about how God began and what God had to work with in the beginning. Did God begin with nothing?

There is a long-standing notion in the Christian faith that God created out of nothing. It is found in the early church writings of the New Testament. Paul writes in his letter to the Romans "God ... calls into existence the things that do not exist." And in Hebrews chapter 11, we read, "By faith we understand that the worlds were prepared by the word of God, so that what is seen was made from things that are not visible." However, in the second verse of Genesis we read "the earth was a formless void and darkness covered the face of the deep." It seems from this that creation is an ordering out of an already existing chaos. There was something, it was chaos. Beginnings can be chaotic, can't they?

Friends, in many ways we are in a beginning together again, and I take my hope from those first words of Genesis. They convey to me that God is already with us in our beginnings. I am so looking forward to beginning with Rev. Dr. Karen Nelson as our new Associate Pastor. She has a collaborative leadership style and generosity of spirit that is contagious. Our welcome reception for her is July 11 and she will share the message in worship on July 18th.

Further, in this new beginning I am guided by the words of Jesuit priest Pedro Arrupe:

Nothing is more practical than finding God, that is, falling in love in a quite absolute, final way. What you are in love with, what seizes your imagination, will affect everything. It will decide what will get you out of bed in the morning, what you will do with your evenings, how you will spend your weekends, what you read, who you know, what breaks your heart, and what amazes you with joy and gratitude. Fall in love. Stay in love. And it will decide everything.

May we place our confidence in God, the source of hope throughout all that life brings us. I pray that we can join together in pursuit of falling in love and staying in love with God.

Introduction to Circuit Ministry

"The Mission of The United Methodist Church is to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world" (The Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church, ¶120). Circuit ministry seeks to accomplish our mission as United Methodists in Iowa. The local church remains the primary point of disciple-making even as we shift to circuit ministry.

Specifically, "the Purpose of Circuit Ministry is to develop a circuit of missionally effective clergy and laity leading together in partnership through 1. Leadership Multiplication, 2. Missional Accountability & Oversight." Circuits bring together churches to grow in our ability to "make disciples of Jesus Christ" and "transform the world." Ministry best happens as passionate and gifted clergy and laity collaborate and partner together. As this happens, we expect generative leadership: leaders who are growing in their likeness of Christ and cultivating others in faith and leadership ("leadership multiplication"). Likewise, churches gain clarity of their expectations and plan of intentional ministry that can be communicated and supported ("missional accountability and oversight").

Several factors prompt the shift to circuit ministry. First, people shared in the Vision 2032 listening sessions that they wanted to be better connected through authentic and faith-filled relationships. Also, isolation and stress have

amplified the need for clergy to be able to come together to support and to pray for one another. Lower apportionment receipts accelerated the pace of the transition, as the Conference reduced the number of superintendents and staff available for support, resourcing, and guidance. Many conferences in the Riverview P. United Methodist connection see a similar reality and are currently adopting a strategy such as Circuit Ministry.

Stephen Ministers, Here When You Need Them

Job loss, illness, bereavement, loneliness, we all experience struggles like these and more as we journey through life. You don't need to go through these things alone. Stephen Ministers are persons trained

to be there with you in your time of trouble. The Stephen Ministry program is a part of our congregational care ministry. All Stephen Ministry contacts are strictly confidential and your personal privacy will always be respected. You may call the church office for a referral to one of the Stephen Minister Leaders.

Circuit Ministry seeks to be a framework from which fruitful, collaborative, and creative ministry can happen in the Iowa Conference. Each circuit will use a similar "framework" and "canvas" yet create its own picture of ministry that fits its unique context.

Within each district, the district superintendent assigns each church or charge to a circuit. Circuits, then, become the basic unit of connection for the Conference with a goal of healthy collaboration in regional, District, and Conference ministry and leadership development. Working in partnership within each circuit, clergy and laity, in communities of faith, will engage in fruitful ministry to fulfill our Mission.

For six-to-eight hours a month, pastors will gather in a "circuit meeting," where they engage in a comprehensive Loving-Learning-Leading process of personal and communal transformation. These meetings are led by an appointed Circuit Clergy Leader and Circuit Laity Leader. While each Circuit Meeting will have a similar process (Loving-Learning-Leading) and include essential elements (such as Covenant, Ministry Action Plans, some Conference-wide learning, and a Reflect-Adjust-Do process), circuits will adapt these Circuit Meetings to their needs, opportunities, and context. Every pastor appointed half-time or greater is expected to participate in these circuit meetings, while those appointed less than half time are invited. If a church does not have a pastor who can attend, the Staff Parish Committee will work with the district superintendent to name the church's participant.

> Leaders in the local church will continue to collaborate with the pastor to identify the primary goals for ministry. Uniquely at the change of appointment, the district superintendent will work with Staff Parish Relations Committee to establish those primary goals, called Missional Expectations. Through the Circuit Ministry process, the local church leaders, including the pastor, will utilize tools of the Ministry Action Planning process to become more missionally effective locally, across the circuit, and beyond.

We live on the campus of Africa University, and have been enjoying visits from our neighbors' children. Delani and Adriel spend hours piecing together the Lego that has survived years of making and breaking. They move on to ever more creative

designs which involve trial and error, patience and starting over. It has reminded me that we are always God's work-in-progress, and our own efforts to live with the times involve trials, successes, failures, and moving on.

We have come to the end of our online academic year, and feel there has been a lot of trial and error, patience... and learning involved! As we walked past the student dormitories last week, there were festivities as students celebrated final-years passing their last semester at Africa University. Dancing, blowing vuvuzelas and making phone calls home - marked the end of 4 or 5 years of study. Most will go home and attend graduation online in July. The July 3rd ceremony will be available for public viewing on both YouTube and Facebook.

- 6 unsharpened pencils with erasers
- 1 box 24 crayons (ONLY 24 count, please)
- 1 box of 12 colored pencils
- 1 pair BLUNT scissors (rounded tip metal blade)
- 1 2 inch or larger eraser

1 - 12 inch/30 centimeter ruler (hard or flexible, must be flat and have metric markings)

In particular need right now are crayons, colored pencils, and notebooks, so watch for the sales and buy a shopping cart full!

RESPONSE Moment Learn - Necessity of a Periodical

The Women's Foreign Missionary Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church was founded on March 23, 1869, in Boston, Massachusetts.Two months later, the society published its first magazine.During the society's second official meeting on March 30, "the necessity of a periodical to represent this missionary work was soon discussed. Some feared it may not be sustained, but friendly hands were ready to support it, among the rest was Mr. Lewis Flanders, who offered to aid the experiment to the extent of \$500, if necessary. So encouraged, the first number of the "Heathen Woman's Friend" was issued in the month of May, under the editorship of Mrs. Wm. F. Warren, and it has since proved its great value to the enterprise. It now ranks as one of the first missionary papers of the world."

The United Methodist Church is a culmination of at least 10 different denominations and about twice as many women's groups affiliated with them - many of whom published their own periodicals. "The Light Along the Way " by previous "Response" editor Carol Marie Herb lists 17 predecessor magazines to "Response", published by various mission and women's groups of United Methodist predecessor denominations. The magazine you're reading continues this important history of women in mission telling the story of women in mission.

The march/april issue of "Response" 2021 shares a Bible study titled, "The Passion of Christ". The article was originally published in a "Response" 31 years ago. The article is an Easter Meditation that invites us to reflect on Jesus' path from the Last Supper to the Resurrection. It's a meditation that can provide encouragement, give us courage, hope and reliance on God every day of the year. The magazine is in the church library and would be an inspiration to anyone who reads it.


UMW Statement on Renewed Israel-Palestinian Violence

NEW YORK - United Methodist Women Director of Public Relations and Marketing Yvette Moore today noted that the organization "grieves for the continued loss of life and opportunities for just peace in Israel and the still Occupied Territories. We pray for peace with justice in Jerusalem. We condemn the eviction threats and abuse against Palestinian families in East Jerusalem that preceded this current wave of violence and call for an immediate cease-fire. The United Methodist Church's "Opposition to Israeli Settlements in Palestinian Lands" resolution was first adopted in 2004 as a call for a just peace in this area, and it was reaffirmed in 2008 and 2012. We reiterate the United Methodist Church's call for the U.S. government to work with the United Nations to end Israeli confiscation of Palestinian land and resources. We call on the United States to end all military aid to the area.

Opposition to Israeli Settlements in Palestinian Lands Excerpt: Moore referred the media to this earlier organizational statement: "The United Methodist Church opposes continued military occupation of the West Bank, Gaza, and East Jerusalem, the confiscation of Palestinian land and water resources, the destruction of Palestinian homes, the continued building of illegal Jewish settlements, and any vision of a 'Greater Israel' that includes the occupied territories and the whole of Jerusalem and its surroundings. We urge the U.S. government to end all military aid to the region, and second to redistribute the large amount of aid now given to Israel and Egypt; to support economic development efforts of nongovernmental organizations throughout the region, including religious institutions, human rights groups, labor unions, and professional groups within Palestinian communities." (from The Book of Resolutions of The United Methodist Church 2016.)
