

Thoughts from Steve

It is hard to believe that eight years ago Janet and I were meeting with the Staff Parish Committee about moving to Cedar Falls. The invitation came as a total surprise to us because we were not on the "move list". We were settled in at Nevada, and we had just completed a major building project. The biggest challenge was leaving our daughter Kim and son-in-law Josh. They were expecting our first grandchild in May, and lived just blocks from us. So we prayed a lot, because we believed, and still believe God has blessed us throughout our ministry. Both of us felt God's call to move to Cedar Falls, and we have never looked back.

A couple of weeks after announcing our move to Cedar Falls, I ran into a good friend of mine in Ames. He was Father Ev Hermann who served as priest at St. Thomas Aquinas in Ames. Father Ev and I had become good friends over the years of crossing paths, sharing weddings, events at ISU, Hospital calling and meeting at the Irish Pub called Dublin Bay. Ev was every body's best friend, and I was fortunate to be part of his circle of pastor friends outside of the church. We became close over the years.

In the hospital hallway, we shared almost simultaneously we were both moving to Cedar Falls. We laughed loud enough that a nurse asked us to go to the family room to talk when we found out he was moving to St. Pats, and I was moving to First. We were going to be neighbors! This was a "God moment" for me in preparing myself to move to Cedar Falls.

After arriving in Cedar Falls, I found myself in the midst of a Building Project that was in its 10th year. There were some obstacles that had to be jumped to make the Building Project a reality. One of the obstacles was purchasing the Sister's House. St Pats owned the big white house on the north side of our block. It was necessary for us to buy it to move forward. The former priest and the sister had blocked the sale of the house for years.

After a few months of getting up to speed on the Building Project, I decided to go talk to my "old friend" Father Ev. With the building plans under my arm, I went over to St. Pats with the goal of demonstrating to Father Ev that we needed to purchase the Sister's House. He could tell right away by looking at the plans that we needed the property to move ahead. He told me, "I will assure you that St. Pats will not stand in the way of your Building Project." And so it was. This was another "God moment" for me in moving to Cedar Falls.

Those first couple of years with Father Ev as a neighbor were a Godsend for me in making the adjustment of moving to Cedar Falls. We planned several joint activities with the hope of St. Pats and First becoming close neighbors. There was a time not so long ago when the churches had picnics and choirs exchanged Sundays. Besides closing the deal on the Sister's House, we accomplished one other thing – The Procession of the Cross on Good Friday.

The first year we had over 300 participate in the Good Friday walk with the cross. We were both moved by the turn out, and worshipping together on an important day. It even made the front page of the Courier! The next Good Friday, Father Ev was dying of cancer. His last words to me were "Walk for me." He died shortly after Easter. I miss him.

We have shared many "God moments" in our Building Project. It has been a great journey to walk together. I hope you will generously support our campaign "New Doors, New Life . . . No Debt!"

Come to the Cross - Ash Wednesday, March 1, 2017

Ash Wednesday Communion & Worship -Wednesday, March 1, 7:00 p.m, Fellowship Hall We invite you to "Come to the Cross" to renew your faith. Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of the season of Lent when we remember Jesus' sacrifice of love on the Cross. For the six weeks leading to Easter we will be focusing on the Cross of Christ.

Our Ash Wednesday Service will be held in the Fellowship Hall this year. This will give us an opportunity to have the cross lifted high in the center of our room. As we sit around it, we will be reminded that the Cross is the center of our attention. Pastor Matt will be preaching. The service will include communion and the imposition of ashes. Communion reminds us what Christ endured out of love for us, with the breaking of his body and shedding of his blood. The imposition of ashes is an ancient ritual that dates back to the church's early beginnings. The sign of the cross with ashes will be offered on the forehead or hand to those attending. The ashes are made from the palms used from our last Palm Sunday service a year ago.

Ash Wednesday will be a meaningful way to begin your Lenten Journey of Faith. This journey passes through the Upper Room and Garden of Gethsemane, then leads to the cross and concludes with the celebration of our risen Lord on Easter.

Church Wide Lenten Study Begins March 8

The last several weeks have been hectic in our household. Viruses, ear aches, strep throat, and other forms of sickness have crept into our lives and held on strong. There was a solid week in February where I literally came to church to do the bare essentials I needed to do, and then went home to go to bed. It left Elizabeth by herself much of the time. Daily household tasks that are normally my responsibility began to literally pile up. Dishes backed up, dog droppings took over the yard, and our trash didn't make it to the curb

that week. Because of this sickness, our house became a real mess. Thankfully, healing has come through the power of prayer and modern medicine. The piles are now smaller, and life is becoming much more manageable again.

This Lent Pastor Steve and I are excited to invite you to join us on a church-wide journey where we acknowledge the mess in our lives. The sickness that has infested our hearts is none other than sin. We are created in the image of God, but for many of us, sin has made that a distant memory. In this preaching and teaching series we will walk through the process of redemption. Honesty about our collective mess is important, but it can also be depressing unless we remind ourselves of the ultimate goal. The good news of the gospel is that by the Grace of Jesus Christ, found in the love and power of his death and resurrection, we can be RESTORED to the image of God in which we were created. This is the goal of the Lenten season.

Pastor Steve and I are going to be co-teaching a class on Wednesday nights around Pastor Tom Berlins book, "Restored: Finding Redemption In Our Mess". The class will be held for 6 consecutive weeks starting on March 8 through Holy Week. Books cost \$12 and participants are encouraged to sign up at the welcome center to reserve a spot and materials for the course. Pastor Steve and I will be going deeper on Sunday mornings as we will both be preaching this series for Lent.

I love the season of Lent. In the days before Easter, Christians are willing to do hard work. Pastors encourage their flocks to hunker down and take a hard look at their lives. In this 6 week journey, you will not only see God enable you to change and clean up your mess, but you can be fully transformed, learning to love God and others the way Jesus did.

Leading by Sharing our Story

Today as I am in my office working on newsletter articles, sermon preparations, emails, and phone calls, I am reminded of an experience I had a few years ago. Our former Bishop, Julius Trimble wanted to meet with me personally because I was soon to be ordained and he likes to get to know the pastors in the conference personally. It was a wonderful time of sharing, dreaming, and praying together with him and the 7 other pastors that were being ordained that year. While he had many wise things to bestow upon us, his conversation keep coming back to a message of encouragement and he also emphasized that the church needs good leadership.

After concluding my time with Bishop Trimble, I made my way to the district office in Hiawatha to take part in the district ministry team that supports the District staff, much like a staff/parish relations committee functions in the local church. We were introduced to Rev. Kikboko Kiboko, who had been assigned as the new District Superintendent for the East Central District starting July 1, 2015. Rev. Kikboko also had a message of encouragement, and said something very prophetic, much like what Bishop Trimble had said. He said, "Today's church does not need pastors who will simply provide churches with what they want. The church needs leaders."

I would have to agree. I believe that the church is beyond the days of providing good ministry "programs" and simply expecting people to come to the church. The model "If you build it they will come" has been dead for a long time. We live in a day and age of pluralism where Christianity is not mainstream anymore. The worldwide church is in need of good leadership that is willing to take the Gospel to new places, to meet new people, and proclaim the one who says, "I make all things new."

The question that I am left with is this: How far am I willing to go to share the Gospel? How far are you willing to go to share the Gospel? Perhaps that is simply over coffee or at the water cooler at work. Perhaps that means sitting down with your children and asking them, "How is it with their soul?" Perhaps that means inviting someone you know to worship with you. How far are we willing to go? The church needs good leadership. Are you willing to step forward in that kind of faith?

I am reminded of Isaiah 6:8–"I heard the voice of the Lord, saying, Whom shall I send, and who will go for us? Then said I, Here am I; send me."

May the Grace of the Lord Jesus Christ be with you this day, and may his Spirit send you out to witness the Good News.

Evidence of the impact can be seen throughout our building. The new Entrance and Gathering Place has made a difference in the atmosphere on Sunday mornings! Our new Nursery and renovated Children's area has made a statement to young families that the future of our church is important. Sunday mornings are like a reunion filled with welcome smiles and the excitement of welcoming new faces. The building has become a new tool for us to grow!

We would not be in this fortunate place if it had not been for the congregation's courageous leap of faith to move forward and build for the future. It truly was a statement of faith in God's faithfulness as shown through the years; it also showed we had faith in ourselves to move ahead and do it! It is a dream realized!

Beginning on Sunday, March 19 we will be kicking off our campaign to retire the debt. We began with a mortgage balance of \$1,461,000, and already we have passed several milestones including the \$1,000,000 Mark and the Halfway Point! Thank you for your generous support. end of 2019. 


Pop Can Drive

Henderson Settlement is one of four mission institutions of the Red Bird Missionary Conference in Kentucky. Their mission is to spread the good news of Jesus Christ through service to the community by meeting basic needs in Appalachia.

In 1925, Methodist minister Hiram Frakes came to the Laurel Fork Valley in Southeastern Kentucky with a dream of educational, economic and spiritual reform for the community. Local families donated 123 acres of land and Frakes started a school for the area children. That was the beginning of Henderson Settlement. Today it consists of 1,600 acres and provides multiple programs and activities for the community.



Henderson Settlement is located in a part of Appalachia that continues to be challenged with issues related to poverty and lack of opportunity. There are serious challenges for children, youth, women seniors and families to be able to live, much less thrive, in the area. There are issues around education, community development, economic development and

health, among others. These are issues that affect communities all over Appalachia, and Henderson Settlement provides opportunities for groups to partner with them to ease the burdens of our brothers and sisters in Christ in Appalachia.

Many of the 2,800 volunteers that come through Henderson each year are dispatched to repair dilapidated homes within a 20-mile radius of Frakes. Other volunteers are put to work on campus in the garden, the thrift store, or other campus buildings. We have 10 spaces reserved for work campers at Henderson Settlement in the Appalachian mountains of Kentucky for the week of June 25-July 1. Becca Nims and Lisa Congdon are working together to plan this multi-generational work trip opportunity. We will find out in late February/early March what sort of project our group will be working on.

Cost for food and lodging while on site is \$230, plus some travel and sightseeing expenses. Our half payment is due on March 24, or \$115 per participant. Your contributions will be used to support Henderson Settlement work projects and programs, and also to underwrite travel costs. Use the special offering envelopes at the display in the Welcome Center.

We also encourage you to support the youth and others in additional fundraising opportunities (such as can and bottle drives) coming up between now and June.



Letting Go Gracefully

One of the most difficult realities faced by most parents is the gradual "letting go" of their children. For one mother, Tracinda Foxe, that "letting go" came much too early in her baby's life and was much too literal. In December of 2005, her apartment building in the Bronx caught on fire. Standing at the window of her third floor apartment she was forced to contemplate the unthinkable. Firefighters below were surrounded by a crowd of on-lookers.

They called out to Tracinda to let her baby fall into their net. Seeing no other viable options, she finally let go of her baby. She and her baby both survived the fire.

In the course of living, we sometimes find ourselves in situations similar to Tracinda. Serious illness, loss of some kind, the weight of life, etc. can make holding on to life as it was in the past impossible. Letting go and moving into a different future can seem next to impossible but the only viable option. Encouragement and support from somebody can make all the difference. Stephen Ministers are trained to do that. They don't try to give answers or to fix things, as much as help you "let go" and walk with you from the past, through the difficult present, and into a changed but more secure future.
