

What If ...

Many of us work in very fast-paced environments that demand results. These results are quantified by numbers. Often times those numbers are calculated by deliverable products, dollars grossed, customer acquisition rates, and project completion dates. Anything less than that is measured as failure. In so many ways it makes sense. It takes products, dollars, clients, and completed goals to make the business world tick. Often times this permeates into the church culture as well.

As a pastor of a large church and with a large staff, there is always the temptation to think this way also. Instead of products, we like to speak about program ministries. Instead of dollars grossed, we look at giving trends. Instead of customer acquisition rates, we measure worship attendance. Instead of project completion dates, we like to talk about achievable God-sized dreams.

Whether an organization is a business or a non-profit like a church, it needs to meet certain quantified numbers to sustain itself. The difference in the church is instead of hoarding our resources, we are called to give them away.

What if we changed the metrics by which we measure ministry success...

What if...deliverable goods changed to the number of those who profess Christ as Lord and Savior?

What if.....customer acquisition changed to the number of those participating in missions outside the church walls...

What if... dollars grossed changed to the amount of dollars allocated to serving the poor, the orphans, the widows, and the needy among us?

What if... project completion dates were changed to bold dreams aligned with God's mission and vision?

What if...

I am fortunate to be serving a church where the metric for effective ministry is not simply based in numbers. While the quantifiable numbers seem to demonstrate effective ministry, there is not a quantifiable metric to know someone is going deeper in their relationship with Christ. The only way to know that is to hear their story. These are stories I love to hear, and they are in plenty at First United Methodist Church.

May we continue to be a church that quantifies success by teaching the Gospel and living it in our daily lives. When we live this way, the Lord will add to the number daily those being saved.

World Communion Sunday offering - October 7



Please know that your estimate of giving is your best guess, not a firm committment - we don't have "pledge police". Further, we treasure your faithfulness, and your estimate of giving will always remain a confidential matter between you and our Finance Manager.

As caretakers of God's church and God's creation, we live on the fruits of our harvest, giving as needed, working as required, and growing something so much bigger than us. Good stewardship leads us to live within our means, and beyond ourselves.

House Meetings Concluded

Through the month of September, Pastor Scott attended 19 house meetings, attended by more than 220 people and got to speak with many of us face-to-face. The house meetings were a chance for Pastor Scott to get to know us in a small-group setting, and also an opportunity for him to listen to our discussions of our church's strengths and concerns.

A common thread from the meetings is that strength is in our people and our relationships. We heard stories from those who received a warm welcome on their first visit and who continue to treasure the close relationships and the opportunities to learn and serve together. The church staff was also mentioned as a strength. Staff members bring energy to the ministry, support each other, and appreciate the congregation. And, it was mentioned more than once that our congegation is loaded with skilled and devoted leaders and potential leaders.

First UMC is location in a growing community. Cedar Falls is growing in population and thus provides many opportunities for ministry and reaching new people with the Gospel. This church willingly shares its facilities to help meet the needs of the larger community. First UMC is already widely recognized in the community as a giving, generous church.

The house meetings were also a venue to discuss our concerns for our church and so we will also be looking into redefining our unifying vision, establishing an intentional plan for faith formation, look for new and creative ways to engage with young adults and families with children, and improve the consistancy of our hospitality.

The result of these house meetings is a proposal for some new ministry plans, as presented by Pastor Scott Kober to the Administrative Council, at their October meeting. The Ad Council approved these plans and voted to move forward with them.

Ministry Plans

- 1. Vision. The congregation will have a Day of Prayer and the pastors will lead a Day of Visioning for the congregation by November 30, 2018. The purpose of this day will be to prayerfully discern where God is leading First UMC and to begin framing a clear and compelling vision that will be widely shared and guide the leaders and the congregation into the future. Following the Day of Visioning, the pastors will appoint a writing team of 3-5 people who will gather the information from the workshop and draft a vision. The vision will be presented to the church council for adoption by January 31, 2019. Immediately upon adoption, the vision will be communicated widely. The lead pastor and SPRC will clarify staff alignment and staff's primary job responsibilities to align with vision by July 1, 2019.
- 2. Intentional plan for faith formation By January 1, 2019, the pastors will appoint a team of 3-5 people to develop an intentional pathway for growing into a mature faith. This team will include the Christian Education coordinator. This plan will be presented to the church council by July 1, 2019. The team will review existing faith formation ministries as well as small groups and place them along the pathway. Resources might include A Disciple's Path (Harnish) and Stride (Schreiner and Willard).
- 3. Hospitality. The pastors and H.O.M.E. Team will develop an intentional plan for extending hospitality to all people at all times, this includes the entire Sunday morning and Wednesday night experience. It will also include a method for consistently following up with guests. The team will present a proposal to the Ad. Council which will be approved and implemented by Easter. 2019.
- 4. Way Forward Conversation. The pastors will have a series of sermons on hard topics and holding up one another in love during difficult conversations. There will be forums to address the options being proposed prior to the special General Conference February 23-26, 2019.

You will emerge equipped and inspired to see your life as a ministry and to share it openly in ways that suit your strengths and skills. In our congregation, Karl Dance, Jan Hoover, Jim Reidy, Chris Congdon, Lisa Congdon, Padma Templeton, Sue Ney, Chris Werling, Shane Waltz, Jon Cooper, and Tony John are graduates of the program, and Rus DeBonis is currently a student. Ask any of them about their experience, or talk to one of our pastors about the painless application process.

If you care deeply about the church, and you feel as though you have skills to offer in any area of ministry, the School for Lay Ministry is an outstanding experience to boost your personal confidence and leave you feeling empowered to pursue that ministry. On September 13th, twenty-eight members of UMW took a field trip to Retrieving Freedom Service Dogs facility west of Waverly, Iowa.

The facility trains dogs for disabled veterans and autistic children's use. Dogs have 20 months of training before they are placed with their recipient. The best dog breeds used are labrador, golden retriever, and labra-doodles. By the time the dogs have completed their training, they will be 22 months old. The cost to train one dog is \$25,000. Their facility relies on monies from a grant, fundraisers, and donations to operate it facilities. Retrieving Freedom places about 18 dogs per year to eligible recipients.

A veteran demonstrated his dog's abilities for us as we watched. We learned when the dog is wearing his vest he is on duty.
