

Please make good decisions regarding church attendance based upon your vulnerability to infection, and your likelihood of being a transmitter of the COVID-19 virus to others.


Small Groups May Meet Again

Learn to Climb Upward

A father tells about his five year old son, Aaron, wanting to learn to climb a large tree in their back yard. He said, "When I lifted Aaron onto the tree's lowest branch, he panicked for fear of falling. I tried to coach him along, telling him to first kneel on the branch, then slowly stand up and climb to the center of the tree. But Aaron was so focused on his fear of falling that he couldn't move. I finally shouted, "Aaron!" Once I had his attention, I told him to quit thinking about falling and think about climbing. Aaron thought about that for a while and then started to climb to the center of the tree. His fear was gone, and he was able to do what he wanted.



The phrase, "think about climbing" is a good one to hold onto. Most of us periodically are faced with change of some kind or an impossible looking task, and find ourselves being fearful. If we give into the fear, we are crippled with respect to moving ahead/upward. But, if we think about climbing- not falling, failing, or being overcome- we can move upward to what we want.

Sometimes illness, losing a job, or loved one, difficulty/tragedy in a loved one's life, various adverse circumstances and so many other things, can cause us to focus more on "falling" then on "climbing upward". Like Aaron was encouraged to change his focus by his father, we can often benefit by another person encouraging us to climb upward. **Stephen Ministers** are trained to do just that. They don't condemn, they aren't shocked by any circumstance, response, or emotions. They just want to be channels through with the love and healing power of God can flow to help people climb upward out of difficulty.

Our church has a team of trained Stephen Ministers who are here to walk with you through times of difficulty. If you or someone you know could benefit from a Stephen Minister, do not hesitate to contact the church office for a confidential referral.

Mission of the Month

We've been gathering supplies for health kits and school kits since summer. Now we have to ship them! It costs a couple bucks to get each kit to it's final destination, where it will help someone in need. You can help us cover the cost of shipping the kits. Mission Ingathering 2020 is a GO!

YES, we will partner with Midwest Mission Distribution Center (MMDC - an UMCOR affiliate) in Pawnee, Illinois, to collect kits at all of the Iowa Ingathering sites on Saturday, November 7. 2020 has been a year of disasters, so these kits are important!

NO, we will not be hosting large group activities such as: youth retreats, bazaars, mission presentations, luncheons, bake sales, quilt auctions, or worship services.

Mission Ingathering will be a "drive through" process this year. Northeast Iowa churches will bring their kits and remittance forms to First UMC Cedar Falls on Saturday, November 7. Volunteers will be on hand to help unload kits and to collect remittance forms. We will not be repacking kits.

Cash donations are also needed! Please consider donating funds for the Mission Ingathering 2020. Much of the money for Iowa UMC District Hunger Grants comes from Ingathering auction, bake sales, luncheons, and bazaar sales, none of which can happen this year. That will leave a huge void. These grants assist Iowa food pantries and help fund community meals right here in our conference. Last year, \$32,000 was granted to Iowa churches from Ingathering giving to go back into their communities.

Our 41st Mission Ingathering will be like no other. We can be flexible, because our purpose is clear – to show the Love of Christ to the world's people by ministering to their needs. Iowa UMCs can and will be difference makers!

UMCOR Hygiene Kits For Disaster Response

We can't plan for disasters – they simply happen, often without warning. You can help by providing supplies for UMCOR hygiene kits. These are distributed at shelters for those who have been displaced by a disaster.

Hygiene kits include

1 new hand towel, unwashed (15x25 to 17x27 inches)

1 new washcloth, unwashed

1 comb - sturdy with at least 6 inches of teeth

1 toenail or fingernail clipper

1 bar bath-size soap in wrapper, 3 oz or larger (no Ivory or Jergen's)

1 adult toothbrush

10 adhesive bandages (3/4 x 3 inches)


We especially need hand towels, washcloths. Bring the items to the table outside the chapel in the Welcome Center

COMMUNITY READ

What it is

The University of Northern Iowa holds an annual campuswide reading event centered around themes of justice and inclusion. This year's book is *How To Be An Anti-Racist*, by Ibram X. Kendi. What began as a UNI campus-wide reading event has spread into the wider Cedar Valley community, with other educational, corporate, and faith-based groups taking part.

The heavy interest in this book comes in the wake of recent, high-profile killings of black Americans, and in the 2018 naming of our community as the worst place in the nation for Black Americans to live. It was a distinction that many found shocking and embarassing.



Why are we involved?

This is a unique opportunity for all members of the community to engage in a common discussion on a pressing issue of justice. We encourage you to read the book and add your voice to the discussion.

Facing our resistance, assumptions, & fears

Many of us are uncomfortable with this. White Americans can feel accused and mischaracterized in discussions of racism. But the problem won't go away by not talking about it. We may learn difficult things about ourselves and we may also learn that we have less to fear than we thought.

Practical Advice

"What can I do?" That question is often asked in frustration by people who are tired of being characterized as oppressors, who don't want to be labeled as racist, or who want to make a positive impact on their community, but don't what to do differently in their daily lives to bring about change. This book, and the community discussion will help to answer the "What Can I Do?" question.

How to Participate

Get the book and read it. How To Be An Anti-Racist, by Ibram X. Kendi. It is available at most book stores in paper, audio, and ebook formats. Our public libraries have limited copies available.

YOUTH

Make A Difference

First UMC youth will gather for a mission work session October 21 at 6:30 to work on two projects: one global and one local.

A. **SoleHope** project: This proposed project involves a "Shoe Making Party" through SoleHope.org where our 7-12 grade youth will work as a group to cut out shoe patterns, which will then be sent to Uganda. Thousands of vulnerable people in Uganda suffer from a crippling parasite called Jiggers, which enters the body through the hands and feet. A simple pair of shoes can help them live a healthier, happier life – free of jiggers and other parasites.

B. Gift basket project: This proposed project involves assembling and delivering baskets of needed supplies along with encouraging/affirming notes to local Cedar Valley charities such as The Boys and Girls Club, House of Hope and The Salvation Army. The baskets will be assembled by our 7-12 grade youth, and meet the needs of people within our local community who rely on these organizations for food, household supplies, after-school programming and much more.

Masks and social distancing will be required. We are planning to host this mission night outside if the weather permits, otherwise we will be in Scott Hall.
